

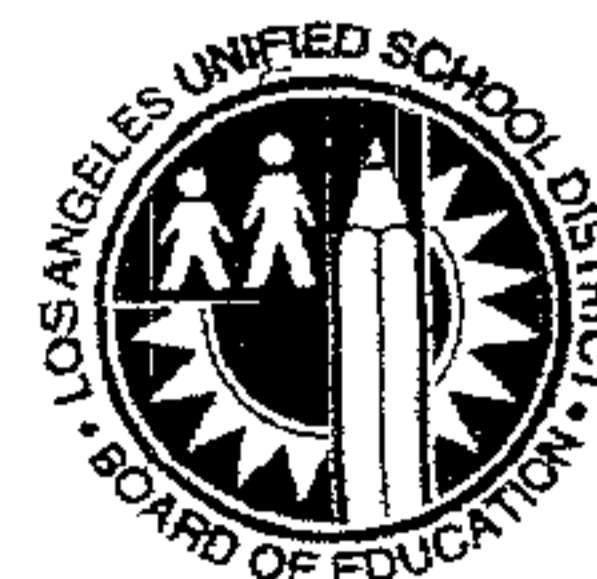
WHAT SHOULD I DO AFTER A BLOOD/BODY FLUID EXPOSURE?

Examples of exposure incidents are: a prick with a contaminated needle, blood splashing on the mucous membranes (eyes, nose or mouth) or blood splattering on skin with open cuts or scrapes that result from the performance of the employee's duties.

In the event of an exposure incident, the site administrator or designated employee shall immediately:

1. Call Employee Health Services at 213 241-6326
2. Document circumstances of exposure-Accident Investigation Report and include the identity of the potential transmitter, if possible.
3. Report claim to SEDGWICK CMS at 1-800-528-7392 and *immediately refer employee for medical evaluation.*
4. All medical information must be forwarded to Dr. William Bierer at Employee Health Services, 333 So. Beaudry 14th Floor Los Angeles, Ca 90017

All medical information regarding the incident is CONFIDENTIAL and must not be included in the site's written report. For further information, the employee should call Employee Health Services.



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UNIVERSAL PRECAUTIONS

Infected persons may not always know that they are infectious or may not wish to share this information with others. Therefore, these precautions should be used in ALL situations when handling blood and body fluids. These precautions are appropriate to prevent the spread of all infectious diseases.

1. WASH HANDS WITH SOAP AND WATER
2. WEAR GLOVES FOR POTENTIAL CONTACT WITH BLOOD OR BODY FLUIDS.
3. CLEAN UP BLOOD AND BODY FLUIDS WITH SOAP AND WATER AND THEN DECONTAMINATE WITH DISINFECTANT.
4. DISPOSE OF CONTAMINATED MATERIALS IN DOUBLE BAGS.
5. USE RESUSCITATION MOUTHPIECE SHIELD FOR ADMINISTERING CPR (FOR PERSONS TRAINED IN CPR).
